



# THERE'S STILL TIME Consider representing your cooperative as a director

The 86th Annual Meeting is fast approaching and it's an important event for the cooperative and its members. Scheduled for Saturday, April 27, this annual gathering offers a platform for updates, discussions, and the election of three representatives to the board of directors. We plan to follow the same format as last year with the meeting held at the Ladysmith headquarters warehouse and livestreamed to the Hayward outpost.

#### Director Elections and Proposed Resolutions

This year's annual meeting will feature director elections for districts 1, 5, and 6. Members residing in these districts received a Director Nomination Petition in January. Those



interested in being a director candidate will need to collect at least fifteen (15) signatures from members (joint memberships constitute one [1] member) within the same district and submit the petition to one of our offices on or before February 27. The deadline is the same for submitting

any proposed resolutions that are to be voted on at the annual meeting. Resolutions provide an avenue for members to propose changes to the cooperative's bylaws.

#### Q. How do I know what district I live in?

#### Q. How do I know if I qualify to be a director?

A. The cooperative bylaws outline the qualifications and election process. You can find the bylaws online at jrec.com/ bylaws-policies or contact the JREC office for a hard copy.

#### Q. How long does a director serve on the board?

A. Elected directors serve a three-year term.

## Q. What type of time commitment is there to be on the board of directors?

A. Directors are expected to attend monthly board meetings; represent the cooperative in state, regional, and national

affairs; and complete the five course Credentialed Cooperative Director training. Directors are expected to stay informed about the electric industry by reading and studying relevant information throughout the month. This ongoing learning process is crucial for making informed decisions during board meetings and staying abreast of industry developments.

#### Make a Difference as a Director

An electric cooperative is guided by an elected board of directors who represent their members' best interests when making important decisions. Directors play a crucial role in decisions impacting rates, strategic plans, capital credit returns, and budgets. They contribute to the formulation and approval of cooperative policies that govern this co-op.

If you reside in district 1, 5, or 6 (indicated in green on the JREC Director District map below) and are ready to make a difference, consider becoming a director candidate. #### A Thoughtful Comparison

Consider the average annual expense to participate in this program of approximately \$6 compared to the money often spent on traditional Valentine's Day gifts. ### AVOID POSTAL DELAYS BY USING SMARTHUB

JREC occasionally receives calls from our members notifying us of a mail delay. With SmartHub, you can avoid postal delays as you will now receive a monthly email that states your bill amount and provides a link to where you can view your bill online. This email is typically sent on the 5th of the month, which is the date the bills are processed.

SmartHub is useful in several ways. You can enroll in automatic payments with a checking account or with a credit card. If that's not right for you, that's okay! You can just view your bill the day it's available without having to wait for the mail to reach your home! It's that easy!

# **CAR HITS POWER POLE...** Do you know what to do?

While driving any time of year, be aware of electrical hazards you may encounter on the road. If you are driving after a storm, keep away from downed power poles, downed power lines, and damaged electric equipment. These can still carry electricity. Coming in contact with the equipment could shock or kill you.

If you are in a car accident with

#### a power pole, do not leave the car until utility professionals tell you it is safe. After a car accident, it may feel instinctive to get out of the vehicle if you can. In this case, the safest place is almost always inside the car.

If the car is in contact with electrical equipment or power line, it could remain energized. Stepping outside could be deadly if your body becomes the path to

Make sure your vehicle is equipped with emergency supplies to help keep you safe on the road.

- Flashlight and batteries
- Charger for your cell phone
- Snowbrush or shovel
- Warm clothing
- Blankets
- Nonperishable food
- Water
- Inflated spare tire
- Wheel wrench
- Tripod jack
- Jumper cables
- First-aid kit



ground for electricity. Even if a power line has landed on the ground, there is still the potential for the area near your car to be energized. Call 9-1-1 and wait for the utility to arrive on the scene to ensure the line is de-energized.

Stay inside the vehicle unless there's fire or imminent risk of fire. If you must get out because of a fire, jump clear of the vehicle without touching it and the ground at the same time. Then hop with feet together so there will not be a voltage difference between your feet, which would give electricity the chance to flow through your body. Hop as far away as you can. Remember: do not get out unless you have to.
