It sure seems like 2021 is moving fast as we are already approaching the deadline for director nomination petitions and proposed bylaw resolutions. As a reminder, that deadline is Tuesday, February 23, at 4 p.m.

The following districts are up for director election this year: District 1, currently represented by incumbent Jane Reich; District 5, represented by incumbent Bill van Doorn; and District 6, which is currently open. Any members living in these districts and desiring to serve on the Jump River Electric Co-op Board of Directors needs to submit their Petition for Director Nomination by February 23, at either office before the close of business.

Petitions were mailed to each member living within these three districts in early January. More information regarding director duties, district maps, and the petitions themselves can be found on the home page of jrec.com.

Electric Cooperatives Create CHARGE EV

Jump River Electric Cooperative along with a group of 28 other electric co-ops have created a regional electric vehicle (EV) charging network across Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, and Minnesota named CHARGE EV, LLC. The network includes over 30 Level 2 and Level 3 charging stations.

Your cooperative has installed two charging stations, one at each of our co-op offices, for our members' convenience. You can stop in at any time and charge your EV. These chargers were added to help alleviate "range anxiety," which is the concern some people have about traveling in an EV without a place to charge their vehicle. We hope that the EV infrastructure created by this group will give people confidence to consider an EV and encourage growth in the EV market.

The CHARGE EV infrastructure is just the start as the group plans for additional investments in the EV market including member education on installing home chargers and encouraging members to test drive EVs. 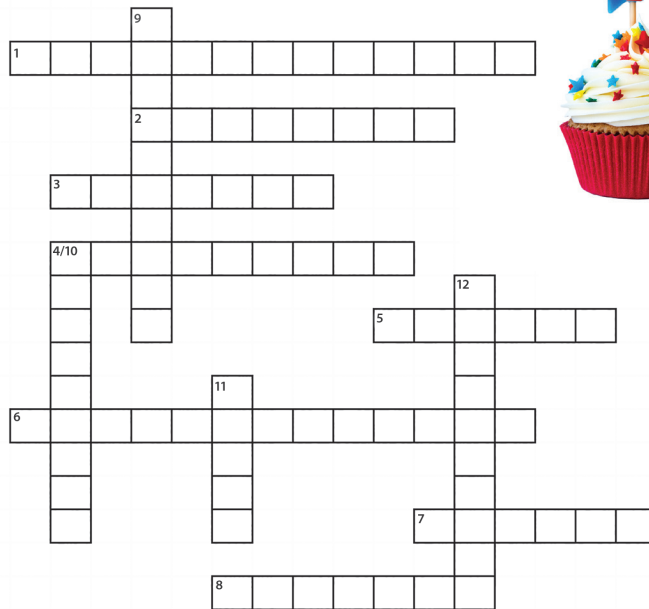

SCHOLARSHIPS INCREASED IN 2021

JREC to award over \$21,000 in scholarships to college-bound students

Giving back to the community is one of the cooperative principles; furthering the education of our area youth and members is another. Both are very important to JREC, and we are proud to be able to help our members and their students meet their educational goals through our scholarship program. Scholarships are available to active members and dependent students of active members.

This year JREC has increased the scholarship amount from \$500 per scholarship to \$750, with the lineworker scholarship remaining at \$800. Not only did we increase the amount of these scholarships, but we also added six homeschool at-large scholarships. Over \$21,000 in scholarships will be awarded in 2021, almost doubling the previous award amount of \$10,800. If you are college-bound, be sure to review all the scholarship opportunities listed below.



\$750 Traditional and At-Large Scholarships

High school seniors graduating from the below list of high schools and whose parent(s) or legal guardian(s) are active members of JREC can apply.

- **Two \$750 Scholarships Per School:** Bruce, Chetek-Weyerhaeuser, Flambeau, Gilman, Hayward, Ladysmith, and Lake Holcombe.
- **One \$750 Scholarship Per School:** LCO, Rib Lake, and Stanley-Boyd.

Six additional at-large scholarships are available to students receiving their high school homeschool diploma and whose parent(s) or legal guardian(s) are active members of JREC.

- **Two \$750 At-Large Scholarships awarded per area:** Hayward, greater Jump River area, and Ladysmith.

\$800 JREC-John Hirschfeld Jr. Memorial Lineworker Scholarship is available to one active member or their dependent student who attends a one-year Electric Power Distribution/Lineworker post-secondary school program. Non-traditional students and high school seniors graduating from one of the above-listed high schools and Winter High School can apply.

\$750 Non-Traditional Scholarships

- **Two JREC-Allen Beadles Memorial Scholarships** will be awarded to non-traditional active members who are continuing their post-secondary education.
- **Two JREC-Charles Kagigebi Memorial Scholarships** will be awarded to non-traditional active members attending the LCO Community College.

A non-traditional student is defined as a dependent student whose parent(s) or legal-guardian(s) or self is an active member of JREC and has received their GED or high school diploma for a minimum of one year prior to applying for the scholarship.

Application and deadline

Applications for high school and the lineworker scholarships can be obtained from the school's guidance counselor. All other scholarships, including the lineworker scholarship, can be found online at jrec.com/scholarships or picked up at one of our offices. Application deadlines vary by scholarship type and school. Please call 715-532-5524 if you have any questions.

All scholarships are financed through Federated Youth Foundation (FYF) Scholarship Program, which is funded from unclaimed capital credits. FYF is a non-profit charitable foundation serving cooperatives across Wisconsin.
